PRIVACY POLICY

This privacy policy relates to procedures which will be followed by the Commission in connection with data collated and collected through our website or via email or written correspondence with the Commission. Where this privacy policy is silent on any issue, the Commission will follow policies and processes of the Department of Justice and Equality and/or the Government of Ireland.

General statement

The Commission welcomes the receipt of submissions from organisations and individuals made via email or through our website. The Commission reserves the right to collect and/or publish any personal information which is voluntarily provided when making a submission to the Commission, or contacting the Commission through its website. The Commission reserves the right to publish submissions in part or in full following the completion of the Commission's work. Anyone making a submission to the Commission will be provided with the opportunity to preview what information they provide to the Commission and/or request that any personal information is redacted prior to publication. Any personal information which is voluntarily provided to the Commission will be treated with the highest standards of security and confidentiality, strictly in accordance with the Data Protection Acts 1988 and 2003.

Submissions

In the interests of transparency, the Commission reserves the right to store and/or publish submissions received and which conform to the Commission's terms of reference. Further, organisations and individuals making a submission should be aware that the submission may be required to be released under the Freedom of Information Act. The Commission may refuse to receive or publish any submission or part of a submission it considers to be irrelevant or contains abusive or defamatory information. Comments involving allegations of any kind against a named or otherwise identifiable person or organisation may be viewed as defamatory by the subject of the comments. Those making submissions may be sued directly for any defamatory allegations in a submission and should avoid making such allegations. Should submissions not be published, those making the submissions may, if the submission has been made to a Designated Public Official, have obligations under the Regulation of Lobbying Act.

Personal identifying information contained in submissions may be published in accordance with the Data Protection Acts 1988 and 2003 and the Freedom of Information Act 2014.

Collection and use of personal information

The Commission does not collect any personal data on this website, apart from information which is voluntarily provided (for example by e-mailing the Commission or making a submission). Aside from reserving the right to publish any information provided in the course of making a submission, any information which is provided in this way is not made available to any third parties, and is used by the Commission only in line with the purpose for which it has been provided.

Collection and use of technical information

This website uses temporary "session" cookies which enable a visitor's web browser to remember which pages on this website have already been visited. No other information is stored in this cookie. Visitors can use this website with no loss of functionality if cookies are disabled from the web browser. Technical details in connection with visits to this website are logged by our internet service provider for our statistical purposes. Glossary of technical terms used

Web browser: The piece of software you use to read web pages. Examples are Google Chrome, Microsoft Internet Explorer, Firefox, Safari and Opera.
